

Puyallup Station Parking and Access Improvements

November 2020 Online open house renderings

This document shares the renderings and descriptions included in the Fall 2020 online open house.

View from the southeast, intersection of 5th Street NW and 2nd Avenue NW

The garage is inspired by Puyallup's history. The rhythm of brick piers and infill walls and metal panels draw from the storefronts that make up the old town core, and complement the expressive steel structure of the pedestrian bridge and stair/elevator towers.

The northern side of the building includes contemporary materials of steel, stainless steel mesh and glass, reflecting the thriving commercial present and future of Puyallup.

Passengers will have convenient access to the garage via a pedestrian bridge spanning 5th Street NW, as shown here. A sustainable demonstration garden, specialty paving and warm lighting will create a welcoming path between the garage and the station. The illuminated colored wall and ceiling at the east stair will act as a beacon for passengers. We'll add BikeLink on-demand electronic bicycle lockers to the station area; one potential location is at the pedestrian bridge, as shown here.

A generous sidewalk will surround the garage as a combined walking, rolling and bicycle path lined with landscaping to soften the garage and surface parking lot edges. Specialty paving and lighting will enhance this path between the garage and the surface parking lot.

A wide planting strip between the building and the sidewalk will feature rain gardens, trees, and a diverse array of plants that will thrive and support a healthy environment. The rhythm of brick piers and half walls will ground the garage at a pedestrian scale, and transparent security screens will allow natural light, air flow, and visibility into the garage's ground level.

Patterns in the natural-toned perforated metal panels that wrap around the south, west and east sides of the garage are inspired by changes in Puyallup's land through time. These themes will be further explored in accompanying interpretative signs located in the landscaping around the garage. The perforations and spacing of the metal panels will allow for ample natural light and ventilation through the upper levels.
