OBJECTIVE OF ACTION

To execute a contract with Cummins Northwest, Inc. (CNI) to retrofit Sound Transit diesel buses with diesel particulate filters to reduce exhaust emission levels.

ACTION

Authorizes the Chief Executive Officer to execute a contract with Cummins Northwest, Inc. for the supply and installation of diesel particulate filters on Sound Transit buses in an amount not to exceed \$888,619, with a contract term beginning September 1, 2003, and ending December 31, 2006.

KEY FEATURES

- Application of the diesel particulate filters in conjunction with use of the Ultra-Low Sulfur Diesel (ULSD) fuel can achieve significant reduction of diesel engine pollution by 70% on harmful elements: hydrocarbon, carbon monoxide, and 90% of particulate matters.
- Supply and installation of diesel particulate filters on 114 Sound Transit diesel buses including associated labor, mounting the necessary hardware, and managing the bus pick up and delivery from Sound Transit's transit partners.
- Provision of maintenance training to partner transit technicians and providing warranty repairs for three years or 150,000 miles.
- · Provision of on-board diagnostic modules.
- The average cost for parts, material, and installation is \$7,800 per bus.
- King County Metro started the installation of diesel particulate filters on their diesel buses in 2002 and Community Transit plans to piggyback on the Sound Transit contract.

- Installation of particulate filters with the use of ULSD meet the 2006 low sulfur fuel requirement and the 2007 emission requirement.
- CNI's proposal was evaluated and recommended from one of two proposals to the request for proposal issued in March. The other proposal was disqualified for not meeting the Buy-America requirement.

BUDGET DISCUSSION

Budget for the contract with CNI is included in the Operations and Maintenance budget and in the Regional Bus Program transit operations subarea budgets. The program has sufficient budget in the Adopted 2003 Budget to cover the 2003 portion of this contract. Budgets related to the contract years 2004 through 2006 will be set aside in the program budget during those respective year's budgeting cycles.

The proposed action is consistent with the current Board-adopted budget and is affordable within Sound Transit's current long-term financial plan and the subarea financial capacity.

Particulate emission from diesel engines is one of the more harmful pollutants in urban areas. As a result, over the past several years, both engine manufacturers and transit agencies throughout the country have been testing and evaluating the effects of using particulate filters to reduce particulate emissions from bus diesel engines. Results indicate that using ULSD in conjunction with particulate filters has produced nearly a 90% reduction of particulate emissions and a 70% reduction in the levels of hydrocarbon and carbon monoxide.

King County Metro began testing ULSD and particulate filters in 2001 and began regular use in 2002 in 369 buses. Community Transit has also began use of ULSD this year and plans to piggyback on Sound Transit's contract for the retrofit of its diesel buses. This contract also includes retrofitting Sound Transit diesel buses operated by Pierce Transit. All new diesel or diesel-electric hybrid buses Sound Transit purchases in the future will come equipped with particulate filters installed at the factory.

CONSEQUENCES OF DELAY

Postponing this action may result in increased costs to reflect the inflation or cancellation of the proposal.

REGIONAL PARTNERSHIP AND COOPERATION

Transit partners' maintenance managers and a Puget Sound Clean Air Agency staff provided the specifications review and participated on the proposal review and the selection committee. Community Transit plans to piggyback on Sound Transit's contract.

A motion of the Finance Committee of the Central Puget Sound Regional Transit Authority authorizing the Chief Executive Officer to execute a contract with Cummins Northwest, Inc. for the supply and installation of diesel particulate filters on Sound Transit buses in an amount not to exceed \$888,619, with a contract term beginning September 1, 2003, and ending December 31, 2006.

Background:

This motion is to establish a contract with Cummins Northwest, Inc. for the supply and installation of diesel particulate filters on Sound Transit diesel buses currently operating in ST Express services. Over the past several years, both engine manufacturers and transit agencies throughout the country, including King County Metro, have been testing the effects of using particulate filters to reduce particulate emissions from bus diesel engines. Results indicate particulate filters have reduced levels of particulate emissions, hydrocarbon, and carbon monoxide.

King County Metro has already installed over 200 filters on its diesel buses and Community Transit plans to piggyback on Sound Transit's contract to retrofit its diesel buses.

Through a competitive procurement process, the Cummins Northwest, Inc.'s proposal was recommended after review and evaluation and by the selection committee comprised of a project manager from Sound Transit, the partner transit agencies vehicle maintenance managers, and a representative from Puget Sound Clean Air Agency.

Motion:

It is hereby moved by the Finance Committee of the Central Puget Sound Regional Transit Authority to authorize the Chief Executive Officer to execute a contract with Cummins Northwest, Inc. for the supply and installation of diesel particulate filters on Sound Transit diesel buses in an amount not to exceed \$888,619, with a contract term beginning September 1, 2003, and ending December 31, 2006.
